German Genealogist Visits Kerrville Genealogical Society

Petra Kuehne of Halle, Saxony-Anhalt, Germany and KGS member Jeannie Berger


I recently had the pleasure of visiting with German genealogist, Petra Kuehne, and her friend and hostess KGS member Jeannie Berger. Petra has been doing some research in Germany on Jeannie's ancestors there. Jeannie has four lines of ancestors from Germany who settled in Gillespie County in the 1840s and 1850s. Once Petra had been introduced to the German settlement in Texas through researching Jeannie's Grona family, she decided she wanted to come see the area for herself. This is Petra's first trip to America. So far, she has been to Fredericksburg and Comfort, and in her remaining two weeks has many more excursions planned. She also wants to make more visits to the Kerrville Genealogical Society's research center. On the day I met Petra there, she had found an immigration record for an uncle who had come to the US from Germany.

Jeannie has been studying her own German family lines for some time. Her great-great grandfather, Hermann Ferdinand Grona, his wife Augusta Wulst, and their two-year-old son, Max, arrived in the Gillespie County settlement in 1857. As an adult, Max Grona moved to Kerrville and resided at 328 Jefferson Street. That house is now the office of the Kerrville Board of

Realtors. Jeannie had been able to find only one other generation back in Germany, Hermann's father, Joseph Theodor Grona. Her research had even included a trip to the LDS Library in Salt Lake City, Utah. Jeannie didn't find what she was looking for in German records there, but they did tell her to write to St. Mary's library which is located adjacent to St. Mary's church in Halle, Saxony-Anhalt, Germany, where Hermann Grona was born. This library called Marienbliothek is Germany's oldest and largest Protestant church library founded in 1552, and now holds 36,000 ancient volumes of reference material dating back to the 11th century including original material owned by Martin Luther and where his Bible is on display. Jeannie says, "I was put in touch with Petra, who has found several generations of the Grona family as well as the ancestors of Joseph Theodor's wife and of Augusta Wulst."

Jeannie's ancestor, Hermann Grona was baptized in the Roman Catholic All Saints Chapel in Halle. Petra provided Jeannie with photos of the All Saints Chapel and the residence where the Grona family lived which is still occupied at Kleine Klausstrasse 7 in Halle.

Petra Kuehne is a free-lance genealogist who works as a volunteer at the Marienbibliothek (St. Mary's Library) in Halle, Saxony-Anhalt, Germany. She first became interested in genealogy when she was 13 years old after finding the marriage and birth certificates of her ancestors from the time her grandparents expressed their intention to marry during the Third Reich in Nazi Germany, when Aryan legacy had to be proved for three generations back.

Later, Petra studied history at the Martin-Luther-University Halle/Wittenberg and she learned how to read the old German script, which is called Kurrente. As a student assistant, she worked on a project for a professor who wanted to know if the church records of the Marienkirche (St. Mary's Church) contained information about the lives of people in the 18th century. She transcribed almost 50,000 church book entries from the old script into modern German.

Wanting to put this knowledge to use, she decided to concentrate on genealogy and since then has been doing work for a number of clients. She is happy to assist anyone in America who is searching for ancestors in Germany.

Irene Van Winkle will present: "In Search of Ancestral Echoes, My Ukrainian Journey"

A Texan with Ukrainian roots, Irene Van Winkle was actually born in Innsbruck, Austria and immigrated to the United States as a young child. She grew up in New York City, graduated from Marymount Manhattan College, and then married a Texan, so she notes, "I got here as fast as I could."

After living in Dallas for about 9 years, where she worked at the Dallas Times Herald, she and her family (husband and two sons) eventually came here in 1990. Irene has been a writer and photographer at West Kerr Current for 12 years. She has worked in various other media outlets in Kerr County, including the Kerrville Mountain Sun, The Kerrville Daily Times. Radio, KERV/KRVL radio, and HTV television. She launched the Sesquicentennial series of family histories at the West Kerr Current in 2006, and to date she has written nearly 340 stories which include narratives about families, places, and events. They range from Indian captives, to German immigrants, Texas Rangers, and Bibletoting preachers to famous events such as the Battle of the Nueces and how the historic Buffalo Soldiers fought to save Major John Bullis. They still appear every other week ... mostly.

Although she traveled across Europe just after graduating from college, she had always dreamed of visiting her ancestral homeland, Ukraine, in Eastern Europe. This dream finally came true in the summer of 2016, when she flew over to the capitol, Kyiv (how Ukrainians write it, not Kiev), and spent three extraordinary weeks finding the places where her family had made their mark including a 100-year-old church her grandfather built and the Carpathian Mountains where her uncle performed underground masses while evading the KGB during the Communist era. She will share not only the photographs from her trip during her talk, but will bring some of the embroidery, pictures of her family, and other information on Ukraine, its culture, people and long history.

Marriage Records of Early Texas - 1824-1846 Published by the Fort Worth Genealogical Society


"Of the 254 counties in present-day Texas, some 36 were created and organized in the days of the Republic of Texas, March 2, 1836, to February 19, 1846.

Before 1836, marriage bonds and contracts were issued in the several colonies. It is tragic to note that the records of some of these early counties of the Republic of Texas have been lost by fire, and, too, that some records are just missing-reason unknown."

Early Texas Birth Records - 1838-1878 Compiled by Gracy, Sumner and Gentry

"As of November 1968, the three of us have visited 73 counties, of which 25 counties have the original book, or, as in a few instances, have transcribed these records verbatim into another volume, such as: Road Minutes A or Marriage Record A. But whenever and wherever found, they are unmistakably the birth registrations ordered by the Constitution of 1869 and provided for by the Thirteenth Legislature, because of their form, which is always: child's name; parents' given name or initials and father's surname; date of birth, color, sex. The records for 1873-1878 have the bonus that when registering a child born during one of these years, the parents often would list all of their previous children, so there are many quite early dates included."
