## On the Shelves at the KGS Research Center & Library

I want to thank both Sharon Ashby and Pat Weber, members of the Collection Committee, for their hard work in assembling four new bookcases (needed to house our expanding collection) and so much more work on re-organizing the collection.

### U. S. Army Camel Files

In the 1800s, the U. S. Army, under Secretary of War Jefferson Davis, imported camels to study their potential use in the Southwest. The Experiment was conducted in Kerr County, Texas at Camp Verde. KGS obtained copies of over 900

official handwritten documents from National Archives. There was no order with the documents received requiring each legal-sized page to be read, organized and eventually bound into 8 volumes covering 1843-1866:

Volume I: Proposals for Camel Use in Southwest

Volume II: March 3, 1855 Congress Approves

Volume III: 33 Camels on Board, Heading to TX

Volume IV: April 29, 1856 – Camels have Landed, 2nd Trip Starts

Volume V: Finding a Base for the Camels

Volume VI: 2nd Shipment Arrives, New Secretary of War – Camel Experiment loses Army Support

Volume VII: More Camels Arrive, Other Uses are Proposed, Army Sells the Camels

Volume VIII: Miscellaneous Papers

\*1809 – General Eaton was in favor of "introducing camels to take the mails and to bear heavy burdens in the Southern States." Newspaper article.

\*January 31, 1848 – "Permit me to suggest for the consideration of your department making the use of camels and dromedaries in the Mexican War." Allen Willson

\*1851 – "Each camel will journey from San Antonio to El Paso (800 miles) and back (1600 miles) 4 times with the year." G. R. Gidden, U.S. Consul at Cairo, Egypt

\*April 1851 – "The ox-wagon trains are now traveling on the El Paso Road at the rate of four miles per diem! Some trains have been 9 months at one point, waiting for forage and water." Colonel Seaton

\*February 15, 1856 – On board the U.S. Ship "Supply" – "The evening of this day No. 22 gave birth to a young camel, having a man to watch by it day and night." February 16, 1856 – "Mother and a calf doing well, this night blowing fresh, has to secure the camels." Taken from *Daily Journal, kept on the Camel Deck* by David D. Porter, Esq., Lieut. Comm. (Among the papers were sketches of how the camels were secured during the voyage.)

\*San Antonio, July 12, 1856 – Letter to Jeff Davis, Secretary of War – "Next week I intend visiting Fort Martin Scott near Fredericksburg, to examine its fitness for the acclimation and breeding of the camels." Henry C. Wayne, Major, U.S. Army

\*San Antonio, July 28, 1856 – Letter to Jeff Davis, Secretary of War – "I returned yesterday from an examination of Fort Martin Scott. This post is situated in a tract of barren sand and post oak. In the immediate vicinity of the Fort there is no grazing worth anything. A post (Camp Verde) having been established at Green Valley within 60 miles of this place, and in a county, according to representations made to me, suitable to our purposes... As far as the intentions of the present Department Commander are concerned, I am at liberty to say that he considers Green Valley an important point, and that troops should be left at it until the Settlement there is strong enough to protect itself." Henry C. Wayne, Major, U.S. Army

\*San Antonio, August 12, 1856 – Letter to Jeff Davis, Secretary of War – "I returned yesterday from the examination of the Camp at Green Valley. The position is in every respect favorable for our animals and for demonstrating their usefulness for burden, for expresses, and for scouting. An abundance of fine grass and good water, of lime to be had for the burning, of sand, stone and timber, and of lumber and shingles to be procured within a distance of five miles, gives me every facility for keeping and sheltering the animals at a comparatively moderate rate." Henry C. Wayne, Major, U.S. Army

\*While still under care of U.S. Army at Camp Verde, it was decided to determine how much time it took for a crew using horses and wagons to get supplies at San Antonio as opposed to a crew using camels. They were sent out at the same time for the round trip. The camel crew returned 40 hours before the horse and wagons crew. Harriet Chesi, KGS, who read every single page in 2010.

## **Water Damage At KGS Research Center & Library**

In August the membership of KGS received a notice that our Research Center & Library would be closed due to water damage. A pipe under the kitchen sink across the hall from KGS had come loose some time after 6:00 on Wednesday evening August 10<sup>th</sup>, and running water was discovered at 6:00 Thursday morning August 11th.

I received a call from UGRA Assistant General Manager, Tammy Thompson, about 8:45 Thursday morning. By the time I got there the UGRA staff was in our Center saving books, computer towers, and anything on the floor. Tammy Thompson, Lab Manager Nicole Shepherd, Travis, Matt, and others were already boxing books, and removing our bookcases even though UGRA had water running down their hallway. Water had reached most parts of the building including the board room, other suites, and the classroom.

As we feverishly removed books and bookcases a gentleman asked me what he could do. I set him to work removing the Texas books in the entrance of the main room. I didn't recognize him. I asked his name and what his job is with UGRA. He was the plumber called Thursday morning to fix the pipe. He said he just felt so bad for us that he wanted to help. He was a big guy and handled some heavy tomes and bookcases for us. Thank you, Mr. Plumber!

After ServPro took care of the water, repairs were made to the drywall and baseboards were replaced. UGRA staff helped us bring bookcases and books back into our Center. We owe the staff at UGRA a huge thank you for helping us. They provided boxes, 2 rolling carts, and manpower to remove books and bookcases. To Tammy, Nicole, Travis, Matt, Hunter, Reagan, and Ben we owe you all a big thank you for all your help.

Due to swift action we can report very minimal damage to a few bookcases and no damage to our valuable collection of over 4,000 genealogy and history resources. Materials have been sorted and replaced. In that process we have gained 4 new bookcases and we've done some necessary rearranging.

We also owe a big thank you to our member and volunteer, Pat Weber, for her many hours spent putting the library and our books back in proper order. Pat wears a lot of hats and we are so grateful to her for her interest in the ongoing viability of Kerrville Genealogical Society. So, if you see Pat Weber and any of the UGRA staff, please thank them.

The Center opened again Tuesday, September 13th. We look forward to resuming the regular business of helping you with your research needs on Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Saturdays 10:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

## **Bushwhack Road**

The following version of how the creek got its name came vebatim from a local publication. I failed to properly source it. Sorry about that.

"On August 1, 1862, Major Tegener and some 68 men, most German and one Mexican, met on the banks of a tributary of Turtle Creek. As the men thought they had 30 days to leave, they were in no hurry. They thought if they delayed, others would also come to join them. Therefore, they took their time, sitting around camp telling stories and singing German songs. It is reputed they did not have weapons to go around, but some had musical instruments

"Nearby settler noticed the unusual number of horsemen coming into the area. They were so afraid of Bushwhackers!

"The rest of the story is history. The men who were trying to leave the state and get to Mexico were massacred by Captain Duff and his men on the bank of the Nueces. And the creek, on the

banks of which they gathered has since been known as Bushwhack Creek. Now the road which follows the creek has been named the Bushwhack Road."

My sources for the following information were the 1920, 1930, 1940 and 1950 censuses, the Kerrville Daily Times, the Kerrville Times, the Kerrville Mountain Sun, and some newspaper advertisements.

Here are the seven households in the general area of Bushwhack Road in 1920:

## Kerrville Mountain Sun, 28 Mar 1946

888 acre sheep and goat ranch on scenic Bushwhack Creek. Roomy rock owner's home. Guest house, barns, etc. 2 rock dams form 2 good fishing lakes. About 12-1/2 miles out over all weather roads.

## Kerrville Mountain Sun, 23 Sep 1947

Ninety four wooded, scenic acres on Bushwhack Creek. The 30-acre field can by irrigated from the spring fed creek. An ideal site for a suburban home or a camp. \$8,500.00

## Kerrville Mountain Sun, 12 Jan 1950

More Than 45 Inches Of Rain At Bushwhack August Albrecht, ranchman living about 13 miles southwest of Kerrville at the head of Bushwhack Creek, has sent in the total rainfall at his ranch during the last year. The total fall was 44.45 inches with 80 points of moisture resulting from a snow in January, making the moisture 46.54 inches.

His neatly kept records give a day by day account, with August being the wettest month when 6.40 inches fell. November was the month when no rain fell in the area, and his record for

December is high, showing 4.30 points when less than three inches fell anywhere else in the county. February of last year, was the second "wettest" month when 5.25 inches fell and April was third, with 5.15

## Kerrville Mountain Sun, 27 Oct 1950

Presbyterians vote to Sell Zastera Tract

\$17,500 for 116 acres on Bushwhack Creek about twelve miles southwest of Kerrville in the Camp Chrysalis vicinity. Willed to church by Mrs. Maude Zastera. Joe Leonard Jr. made the best offer.
